John was a cheeky chappy, full of innuendos and rude jokes but he also had charm and was always there if you needed him. He missed his wife, June, so much but had good support from family, friends and carers.

As a Hucknall U3A member he set up the Pub Quiz & Lunch Group at the Nabb Inn, which was his "local". Unfortunately his health meant he could not continue with this particular group, which has continued under a new Group Leader. He also set up the Hucknall U3A Music for Pleasure Group which met at his home and this gave great enjoyment to both John and the other group members.

His funeral was held on Friday, 1st February at the Northern Cemetery church, Bulwell.

David will be bringing his young Labradoodle who is being trained as a guide dog.





Short Course: 3 sessions

A brief study of two Nottinghamshire born writers Alan Sillitoe and DH Lawrence

Alan Sillitoe was a Nottingham born English writer and one of the so-called "angry young men" of the 1950s. He disliked the label, as did most of the other writers to whom it was applied. He is best known for his debut novel Saturday Night and Sunday Morning and his early short story The Loneliness of the Long Distance Runner, both of which were adapted into films.





David Herbert Lawrence was an English writer and poet. His collected works represent, among other things, an extended reflection upon the dehumanising effects of modernity and industrialisation. Some of the issues Lawrence explores are sexuality, emotional health, vitality, spontaneity, and instinct.

The format will be :Introduction, view the film, discussion.

PICKLEBALL GROUP

Is Hucknall U3A unique in having the only Pickleball Interest Group in the UK?. The players were introduced to the game by member Chris Garner who flies south to Florida for the winter. There the game is hugely popular with retirees, who mostly play outdoors. It is overtaking tennis in popularity as it is more suited to those whose most athletic years have passed, and it's a game that relies on touch and tactics and where raw power is largely negated. In the US there are tournaments in most states and the game is played by all ages, with professional coaches working from beginner to elite level. A Pickleball court has almost the same dimensions as a badminton court so many sports halls could offer this game. The net is set at 36 inches and players use a paddle (like a table-tennis bat on steroids) and an airball. The rules of the game are very simple and make for long rallies.



Basic equipment was bought to get the group started, but many members have now bought their own paddles. The group has 20 regular players but other members are most welcome to join us each Thursday from 2pm to 4pm at Hucknall leisure Centre. Bob McEwen.

SCIENCE GROUP 1



On our first meeting of 2019 a power point presentation was given by Bob McEwan on How Satellites rule the world. A satellite is an artificial body placed in orbit around the earth or moon or another planet in order to collect information or for communication.

Common types include military and civilian Earth observation **satellites**, communications **satellites**, navigation **satellites**, weather **satellites**, and space telescopes. Space stations and human spacecraft in orbit are also **satellites**.

Snippets Corner - Snippets provide information to other members of the group and it is very informative, one of the members read from a newspaper cutting about a Plastic Headset which was called a Modius. It appears to zap the vestibular nerve behind the ear and possibly could help struggling dieters lose weight. Now a trial is underway at the University in Ulster.

Within our scientific research programme we have to find out about past and present scientists this month it was a women named Tu Youyou she is a Chinese pharmaceutical chemist and educator. She discovered artemisinin and dihydroartemisinin, used to treat malaria, a significant breakthrough in 20th-century tropical medicine, saving millions of lives in South China, Southeast Asia, Africa, and South.

SCIENCE GROUP 2

In January we looked at the discovery, properties and uses of metals through the ages.

David Wormall added an interesting and entertaining talk on metals in vehicle manufacturing. Much of this was based on his many years in the motor trade and it initiated several interesting questions from the group.
