Message from our Chair

A September 'Hello' to all members

Thank you for the significant response to our online AGM and for supporting the resolutions.

As Barrie stated in his August message he did not expect to be our chairman beyond April's AGM.

During the period between the March lockdown and now there was lots of correspondence to deal with, decisions to make and frequent Zoom meetings to attend by the Chair.

On behalf of all of us at Hucknall and District U3A we extend our thanks to Barrie for carrying on and for remaining on the committee until April 2022. We would also like to thank Melvyn Francis for standing as Vice Chair and to Greg Umney who has taken on the role of Membership Secretary following on from Marquerite who did a great job for the maximum term of 6 years.

What we are experiencing today is unprecedented in our lifetime. However we know about the 'Spanish Flu' and from an even earlier time the Black Death.

In the spring of 1918 Mother Nature unleashed the deadliest strain of influenza in modern history. The virus infected as much as 40 percent of the global population over the next 18 months. Of these, an estimated 20 to 50 million died—more than the roughly 17 million people killed during the First World War. Spain was one of only a few major European countries to remain neutral during World War I. Unlike in the Allied and Central Powers nations, where wartime censors suppressed news of the flu to avoid affecting morale, the Spanish media was free to report on it in detail. Hence it was referred to as the 'Spanish Flu'.

Today we are adapting our lifestyles to minimise the spread and effects of Covid-19. As we are aware older people usually suffer more severe effects than young people, this means it is even more important for U3As to adopt a common sense safety first approach to restarting activities.

National U3A advice follows from the current Government advice which changes as circumstances change.

Information relating to current advice follows in this newsletter.

Some outdoor groups are making plans to start U3A organised sessions provided the situation remains fairly stable over the next few weeks.

SCAM NEWS UPDATE

What to do if you're the victim of a bank transfer scam (APP)

An APP is an 'authorised push payment 'scam, also known as a bank transfer scam.

It occurs when you –knowingly or unknowingly –transfer money from your own bank account to one belonging to a scammer.

For example, a scammer pretends to be from your bank's fraud team and warns you that you need to move your money to a safe account but it's actually an account the fraudster controls.

If you have been tricked into transferring money to the account of someone you don't know, you might have been the victim of what is known as authorised push payment (APP) fraud.

Take action:

Contact your bank immediately

If you think you've been scammed, you should call your bank or card provider immediately.

Tell the bank what happened, and let them know the bank account number your money was sent to.

Your bank might be able to either stop the transaction from going ahead or recover your money from the fraudster's account. But speed is of the essence for this, so it's important to let your bank know as soon as it happens.

Also: Contact the bank where your money was sent

You should also contact the bank where your money was sent and let it know the account number as it may be able to halt the money and get it back for you.

A current local Council Tax Phone Scam -an example of an APP

Local residents have been warned after reports that fraudsters have been targeting people with a council tax phone scam.

People living in the area have reported receiving a phone call purporting to be from Ashfield or Gedling Council claiming they were due a council tax rebate.

The fraudsters then attempt to get bank details from the victim, saying the information is needed to pay the rebate.

Following increasing reports, the councils have issued a warning to residents.

They said: "We've been made aware of a council tax phone scam taking place, including recently in the local area.

"We're asking residents to take care if anyone contacts you to discuss your council tax, especially if they are offering a substantial refund and asking for bank details.

"Our officers may occasionally contact residents directly to discuss their accounts and offer refunds, but if you have any doubt, about who you are speaking to, take their name and call our switchboard number

Covid and U3A Interest Groups and Activities as at 24.08.2020

A summary of the current situation in relation to the U3A guidelines on restarting 'face to face' activities

Individual Responsibilities

Before any individual member decides to take part in any activity they must first consider their own unique situation. As an age group we are generally classed as vulnerable to the effects of Covid-19 and some members will have some health issues which compound that.

It is therefore essential that during the this pandemic it is important for all U3A members planning to participate in an activity or interest group consider their own personal health circumstances before taking part

U3A Personal Members' Activity Checklist – (Pre-attendance

- 1. All participants to review their own personal health and circumstances and refer to the NHS Website in <u>England</u>, <u>Wales</u> or <u>Scotland</u> for further information if you are at higher risk of getting seriously ill from coronavirus.
- 2. Consider the health risk category of anyone else you are living with in your household.
- 3. Review the risk check list for the activity you intend to take part in completed by your U3A group organiser and consider if it is the right decision for you to take part without adverse risk to yourself or household at this time.
- 4. Do not take part if you or someone else from your household has covid-19 symptoms these include a high temperature, a new continuous cough and the loss, or a change to your sense of smell or taste.

U3A advice in relation to restarting activities August 24th 2020

As you may be well aware the following would are subject to change in line with Government and U3A National guidelines

NOTE: In any context where larger numbers of people may be able to come together for organised activities or to take part in risk assessed activities in Covid-19 Safe Premises, **no more than 30 people can attend.**

Location

In all venues it is important to ensure they are Covid-Secure, adopt a Covid-Secure approach to usage and that you follow their guidance for use. Covid-Secure means that the venue has carried out a Covid-19 risk assessment that demonstrates its use can meet social distancing and hygiene recommendations.

Note: The John Godber Centre has achieved Covid -secure status

In addition, it is recommended that all members visiting a third-party venue have and use their own personal hand sanitiser, wear gloves in areas of multiple use, and wear a mask where appropriate.

Do not share any refreshments of any nature.

Sedentary Interest Group Activity

Interest groups such as social sciences, languages or any other topic that does not require sharing or handling items should follow these guidelines.

Group Leaders must:

- Complete a written assessment of how many participants can attend the venue whilst ensuring social distancing is maintained in line with Covid-19 guidance provided by the venue
- Advise members that all materials required in the session must be brought by themselves to the session and used individually e.g. books or similar materials must not be shared.
- Any devices used to show a recording must be operated by one person and they should be wiped with appropriate anti-virus wipes before and after use.
- If venue chairs/ tables are being used, check with hall providers how these are sanitised before and after use.

Outdoor Active Interest Groups

Prior to commencing walking/cycling groups, a Group Leader must:

 Record an assessment of how the walk/cycling interest group will comply with the Covid guidelines

Which are:

- Groups must have a plan in place to limit group size up to 30 people.
- Groups must have a record of who has attended the activity to support contact tracing.
- Groups must follow the government guidelines on physical distancing.
- A risk assessment is completed for each walk/ride
- All members participating in the walking/cycling to be advised how they must comply with the Covid guidance when participating in the walk/ride

For all activities:

Prior to the interest group meeting the Group Leader must:

- Remind members of hygiene requirements, for example, to bring hand sanitizer, face masks and not to share refreshments.
- Ask each member to complete details of registration for the session for track and trace which must be kept by the Group Leader/Convenor for a minimum of 21 days
- Remind members not to participate if they are experiencing Covid-19 symptoms
- Ensure the risk assessment of the activity is up to date

Overall it is a matter of each of us exercising common sense in minimising risk to ourselves and others.

CREATIVE WRITING GROUP

Once again, even though the Creative Writing Group has now closed, I thought you might be interested in the following which was first written in February, 2016. We were told to choose a scene and write about it.

BLISS!

It had been a pleasant summer's day, that Wednesday in July, not sunny but warm. The Hucknall U3A Lunch Group had had a lovely three-hour cruise and lunch down the River Trent on the Nottingham Princess Riverboat. It had been a much more relaxed lunch than our usual monthly event as, after the lunch itself was over, instead of disappearing home straight away, we all sat on deck and watched the world go by. We marvelled at the expensive looking homes built on the riverside and at the crudely made nests also built on the riverside. Cyclists waved to us from the Victoria Embankment, rowers scowled as we broke their concentration and swans and Canada geese quickly swam away from the eddies made by the riverboat.

Eventually it was time to go home, back to our usual early evening activities. I watched some television until it became dark and, being bored, flicked from channel to channel to find something worth watching. And there it was, a BBC Four programme called "The Canal Trip" which had been filmed in real time and contained no commentary, music or presenter and showed nothing more exciting than passing boats, changing scenery and the occasional passer-by in the distance walking along the towpath. I started to watch, wondering when the commentary would begin – but it didn't. Surely something would happen soon, I asked myself?

I continued to watch, becoming mesmerised by this experiment in **slow TV** filmed down one of Britain's historic waterways, the Kennet and Avon Canal. The programme, which switched from colour to black and white, featured facts about canal construction which appeared on the water in text, a very original idea which negated the need for a commentary. I checked how long the programme would be on for and was quite surprised that it would last for two hours. Two hours! Could I really sit and watch this programme for two hours? But I was so hypnotised by the sounds of the birds singing, the crunch of approaching cyclists' wheels on the gravel, the wind rustling the leaves which overhung the canal and the slow-moving background and interesting facts emerging from the water that I just sat back and enjoyed it. It was such a lovely coincidence that we had been on our own trip on the water earlier that day.

Later I wasn't surprised to find that thousands of other viewers had felt exactly the same way as I had about the programme. Apparently, the show fetched 506,000 viewers and had a peak of 599,000, well above the BBC Four slot average of 340,000. Britain has so much to offer, whether it be these canals, the Lochs of Scotland, the Peak & Lake Districts, or the Yorkshire Moors. Wouldn't it be great if the BBC made a whole series of these films and encouraged people to visit places that might even be on their own doorsteps or just an hour or so away. No need to spend money on an expensive trip to Venice in order to visit the Grand Canal, not when the Kennet and Avon Canal is on your doorstep! With the help of films such as this and the hard work of the Canal Conservationists, it is hoped that the future of even the grottiest canal's future is ensured for the benefit of all.





SCIENCE GROUP 2

Zoom Meeting August 21st - This month there were welcome contributions from several members.

David Wormall started proceedings talking about Ellen Ochoa an American engineer, former astronaut and former director of the Johnson Space Centre. In 1993 she became the first Hispanic woman to go to space when she served on a nine-day mission aboard the Space Shuttle Discovery.

Bob McEwen followed with an informative and entertaining talk about Americium a synthetic radioactive chemical element with the symbol Am and atomic number 95.

Complete with a 'Blue Peter' inspired visual aid Bob explained how:

Americium-241 a very low-activity radioactive element that emits alpha particles, a low-energy form of radiation is used in smoke detectors.

As air passes across the americium source within the detector, the radiation ionises any smoke particles. This ionised air is then picked up by an electronic sensor sounding the alarm.

Initiated by contributions from Ann and Ian Murray there was much lively audience participation around the sustainability of the Earth due to various factors caused by humans such as climate change, fossil burning countries and the demands of rapid population growth. To be continued.

WALKING GROUP (SHORT)

Our route took us through a short section of the Papplewick Green estate before taking the 'yellow brick' bridleway alongside the Leen Valley golf course before branching off to the footpath alongside the River Leen which emerges on Papplewick Lane.

The next 2 sections were Moor Pond Wood and Papplewick Dam Wood where we stopped for a group photograph. From 1782 to 1828 the power of the river was harnessed for cotton spinning at Castle Mill .Cutting edge technology in its day.

A meander up a gentle slope took us into Papplewick Church for a look around and a drinks stop.

The final section was through Linby village and across to The Ranges, the former Linby Colliery spoil heap, now redeveloped as country/recreational park. At the top there are expansive views in all directions.
