Message from our Chair

November means we are well into the autumn months.

An obvious sign all around us are the interestingly coloured leaves that slowly drop from trees and shrubs to blow about and carpet the ground. But why do some plants shed their leaves before winter?. It turns out autumnal leaf drop is a form of self-protection. While evergreen plants in cold climates have thick waxes and resins to protect their leaves from freezing and fracturing, deciduous species generally have thin leaves that are susceptible to cold temperatures. By the end of summer, many leaves are insect-eaten, diseased, or otherwise damaged. Dropping them gives the plant a fresh start in the spring, and the nutrients from the decaying leaves are recycled to help grow the next leafy generation.

Some tree facts:

There are over 60,000 species of trees worldwide but in the UK we have just 32.

A mature tree can absorb more than 48 pounds of carbon dioxide each year, removing and storing the carbon while releasing the oxygen back into the air.

They also prevent soil from eroding into our waterways, reduce storm water runoff, and lessen flood damage.

Some of you may have read that the u3a are hoping to plant 5000 trees in celebration of the 40th anniversary of the UK u3a movement.

u3a 40th Anniversary Woodland - Individual Trees

Choose to buy individual trees which will be planted to create our u3a Anniversary Woodland and help support the environment, wildlife and climate.

Every tree sold makes a difference and helps the movement get nearer its target of planting 5,000 trees by the end of the planting season in Spring next year. You will receive a specially designed certificate to download as a memento of your contribution to the environment and to the u3a movement. Please select the number of trees you would like to buy then click customise to add your name to the certificate. *Please note the u3a Anniversary Woodland is located on the England/Wales border in the Brecon Beacons National Park. The trees – two-year old saplings - will be native, deciduous trees; a mix of native species will be appropriate to the chosen site. Your purchase includes planting the tree(s), plus 12 years of maintenance to ensure the tree(s) become established.

This is for **individual members** to choose to donate £7.50 for each tree.

Vice Chairman Melvyn summarised the current situation regarding members who have volunteered for roles on the new committee from April 2022

Greg reported 154 members at the October meeting and that we now have 449 full, 17 associated and 18 affiliated members with enquiries continually trickling in.

In any other business it was agreed to have a Christmas Film on Wednesday December 8th and at the same time have a 'final' book stall at the back of the hall at JGC.

We also discussed raising money towards a portable defibrillator for general use at the JGC via individual donations and group events, again more on this later.

Finally we are indebted to our Business Secretary Mark who produced a detailed analysis of our u3a financial position covering income and expenditure comparisons from 2017 to 2021 with a projected forecast for 2022.

The speaker is Dr Stephen Walker who is the Chairman of 'The Friends of Moor Pond Wood' group and his talk is summarised below.:

'A thread in the web of time': the archaeology of the 18thC cotton mills at Papplewick.

Over the last 20 years archaeological exploration has provided evidence about how the cotton mills in the Leen Valley were supplied with water, and how the system was modified to account for changing circumstances. The talk will report and discuss the progress of the work.

The Man who invented Christmas – a modern classic

Film Summary:

In 1843, the celebrated British novelist, Charles Dickens, is at a low point in his career with three flops behind him and his family expenses piling up at home. Determined to recover, Dickens decides to write a Christmas story and self-publish it in less than two months. As Dickens labours writing on such short notice, his estranged father and mother come to stay with him. Still haunted by painful memories of his father ruining his childhood by his financial irresponsibility, Dickens develops a writer's block which seems to have no solution. As such, Dickens must face his personal demons epitomized through his characters, especially in his imagined conversations with Ebenezer Scrooge. Now with a looming deadline, Dickens struggles for inspiration against his frustrations and his characters' opinions in a literary challenge creating a classic tale that would define the essential soul of modern Christmas.

NOVEMBER SCAMS UPDATE

How to spot a scam

Ask yourself the following questions. If you answer yes to any of them, there's a good chance it's a scam.

1. Have you been contacted out of the blue?

Cold calls or unexpected emails or messages should raise suspicion, especially if you're asked to give personal or payment details. It's very unusual for legitimate organisations to contact you and ask for sensitive information if you're not expecting them to. If you're not 100% convinced about the identity of the caller, hang up and contact the company directly.

2. Have you been asked to share personal details?

Never share your personal details with anyone if you can't confirm they are who they say they are. Phone scammers will often try and get valuable personal data from you, and they can use this to steal your money, or even to use your identity to use fraudulently.

3. Are you being asked to keep it secret?

It's important you can discuss any agreements with your friends, family or advisors. Asking you to keep quiet is a way to keep you away from the advice and support you need in making a decision

4. Are you being pressured to make a decision?

Fraudsters often try to hurry your decision making. Don't let anyone make you feel under pressure - it's OK to take a break and think things through if you're not sure. Sales staff should always give you time and space to make an informed decision; anyone who tries to rush you should not be trusted.

5. Are there spelling and grammar mistakes?

Emails or messages littered with spelling and grammar mistakes are a scam giveaway. Legitimate organisations will rarely, if ever, make spelling or grammatical mistakes in their emails to you because they've been put together by professionals and checked before they're sent.

WALKING GROUP (MID LENGTH WALKS)

Our October walk began at Codnor Park Reservoir and 20 walkers set off along Cromford Canal in the direction of the Butterley Tunnel. We left the canal to look at a group of terraced cottages that were built to accommodate the workers who in the mid-1800s were employed in the Butterley foundries. Arriving at the tunnel entrance we climbed up 30 steps and entered the wooded tranquil site of The Golden Valley Woodland Burial Ground. Returning to the valley, we followed the line of the Midland Railway before turning south, to cross the Golden Valley Light Railway and through Jubilee Wood heading towards Codnor.
