MARCH SCAMS UPDATE

I have been contacted by two of our members who have recently experienced a current scam around TV Licences.

Fraudsters are sending out fake TV Licence refund emails that lead to convincing looking websites in a bid to steal a would be victim bank account details.

They claim that TV Licensing have been trying to get hold of recipients regarding an overpayment refund or that due to invalid account details a credit was not possible.

The refund links lead to cloned TV Licensing websites that are designed to harvest bank account and credit card details.

TV Licensing's tips for spotting a scam email

- Check the email contains your name TV licensing will always include your name in any emails they send you.
- Check the email subject line anything along the lines of "Action required", "Security Alert", "System Upgrade", "There is a secure message waiting for you", and so on, should be treated as suspect.
- Check the email address does the email address look like one that TV Licensing use? For example donotreply@tvlicensing.co.uk. Look closely as often the address may be similar.
- Check for a change in style often the scammers will take the real emails and amend them. Look out for changes in the wording used, especially if it seems too casual or familiar.
- Check for spelling and grammar are there any spelling mistakes, missing full stops or other grammatical errors?
- Never provide details by email TV licensing will never ask you to reply to an email and provide bank details or personal information.

To report a fraud and receive a police crime reference number, call Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040

A phone call scam

The other member reported scam is a phone call attempt to get your bank details because:

'You have overpaid on your electrical appliance breakdown protection policy'

It goes on 'Please let us have your bank details in order that we can refund £100.00'

Put the phone down and block the caller.

GARDENING GROUP

We were disappointed that our speaker cancelled for our last meeting, as she has now retired from giving talks but we still enjoyed an active and learning experience! Thank you to all who came and for your input to the meeting.

Spring has finally shown its face with all the lovely new growth, colour and fragrance. And we can also do a spring tidy-up- cutting back any dead foliage from last year's plants, pruning roses and a final trim of the long water shoots on apple trees. Winter Jasmine can be trimmed after flowering to encourage blooms for next year and dead-heading pansies will encourage more flowers instead of seed-setting. Summer bulbs such as lilies and Gladioli, can be planted now as the soil warms up, but hold off sowing seeds as they could become too leggy. Later sowings soon catch up. Check pots and containers for the dreaded vine weevil and be aware that slugs are becoming more active. Rake up the soil to expose them and their eggs for hungry birds. The smallest slugs are often the hungriest so to protect new young shoots scatter a few organic slug pellets around the emerging stems.

The museum is located in the Silk Mill, next to the River Derwent, and the building dates from the early 1700s. Since its recent re-opening, it now displays a fascinating number of items which were all made in Derby, ranging from a Rolls Royce jet engine to a section of cast iron aqueduct and evening dresses made from man-made fibres in the 1960s. The museum is free to visit, and many of the exhibits are likely to bring back memories of our working lives.

The photo shows the 'exploded' Toyota car, made near Derby, which is suspended over the entrance to the museum.

NEW BOOK – HUCKNALL'S HEROES.

When the Great War began in 1914 the town of Hucknall, Nottinghamshire, had a population of around sixteen thousand. During the following five years, over three thousand Hucknall men enlisted into the armed forces to fight for King and Country. Over 400 of them never came back. Of those that did return, many suffered for the rest of their lives.

After two years of research, Andy McKinnon has found over 2,600 of those men. This book tells their story.

READING GROUP

SCIENCE GROUP

At our March meeting we had a presentation about the different types of defibrillators and how they work. When the JGC model arrives we will have a demonstration of how to use it in practice.

Bob McEwen then enlightened us with his interesting illustrated talk about flies.

He explained that Flies are insects of the order Diptera, the name being derived from the Greek for 2 and wings.

Bob explained that Diptera is a large order containing millions of species including horse-flies, crane flies, hoverflies and many others.

Although they themselves are usually considered to be annoying pests he explained how they actually help to control a variety of pests. Many dipterans such as bee flies and hoverflies are also important pollinators of crop plants. Other types are scavengers and aid in the decomposition of dead animals and plants.

After the break we had a presentation about weather predicting and the different types of rainfall. Members then selected the name of famous and often unsung women scientists to report back with a max 2 minute summary at a future meeting.

Please note the next meeting is Friday May 20th as April 15th is Good Friday.



WALKING GROUP (SHORT WALKS)

In March we set off from the IKEA complex car park for a 4.5 mile walk which took us across the recently opened Bennerley Viaduct which is fast becoming a very popular local tourist attraction.





April 21st Walk

This month we are starting from the lower car park at the Gedling Country Park , Spring Lane entrance (NG4 4PE)

The Spring Lane entrance car parking area has recently been increased and is the main car park. The car park is near to the visitor centre, toilets and Cafe 1899.

The turning is well signposted and is on the right less than a mile down Spring Lane

The park which opened in 2015 has 580 acres of open space, footpaths and wildlife, with stunning views over the surrounding areas.

We will be walking the 'Low Hazels (Green) route' which is a little under 4 miles but with some short fairly steep parts. The rewards for the uphill bits are the views and 2 viewing platforms which provide views as far as Lincolnshire and Leicestershire. Each platform has interpretation panels with information about some of the sights you can see, including Lincoln Cathedral, St Mary Magdalene Church in Newark, Gunthorpe Lock and Belvoir Castle.
