David Rose has kept you very well informed about various scams in the past and what actions to take to deal with them. Please continue to be careful and wary in this area. Sadly, many people continue to be duped up and down the country.

The National U3A have devised an electronic system named Beacon which is designed for use by individual U3A's. The system is designed to cover all aspects of the work of the local U3A, including Membership records, Calendars, emails and many other aspects of the work of the local U3A. Several of your Committee will be visiting Carlton U3A late in June to learn more about this system.

### **Recent local 'Spam' incidents from callers claiming to be from TPS**

Telephone Preference Service (TPS) is a free service for consumers wanting to register and we would never contact you in order to obtain payment. Please be aware of companies calling claiming to be TPS or BT asking for a fee to register/renew an expired or soon to expire TPS registration.

There are various companies offering services that they claim will stop unsolicited calls. TPS is not associated to any of these companies. They may be commercial companies offering services for which they charge a fee and some may be fraudulent.

TPS is concerned about such outfits misrepresenting our organisation and will collate and report misrepresentation to the appropriate regulatory bodies and will cooperate with Trading Standards and/or other agencies to investigate cases where such calls are fraudulent.

If you continue to receive these types of calls, then I would encourage you to report such calls to Citizens Advice Consumer Service (CACS) and/or Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or visit their website.

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## **WALKING GROUP (MID LENGTH)**

And so our group of 28 set off from The Magna Charta Pub in Lowdham - the 'h' was debated!

After a steady climb along an overgrown path we emerged to views of the Trent valley on our right. Undeterred by stampeding cows, we descended to Cliff Mill, a late C18 cotton water mill, the first of three mills to be seen along the Dover Beck, on the walk. (In 1799, 7 year old Robert Blincoe along with 80 other waifs from a London workhouse was promised 'roast beef, plum pudding, silver watches and plenty of cash in their pockets to come and work in the mill'. What they actually experienced was 15 hour days, thrashings, unguarded machinery and starvation for the next 14 years.

On from the mill we crossed fields of inquisitive cows and nonchalant sheep before arriving at Hoveringham Mill (a corn mill). After circling the fishing lake we crossed the railway line, progress halted only by the passing of an East Midlands train and a disgruntled cyclist. The coffee stop was at the C13 St Laurence church in the tranquil village of Gonalston. Next, the busy A612 before returning to arable land and a steady climb up towards the highest point of the walk, affording views of Thurgarton and the surrounding countryside. The lunch stop (well earned) was at Hagg Cottage. Then it was all downhill, with views of Epperstone to our right, finally arriving at Lowdham Mill (corn again), and the Main Street with its' Gold postbox and plaque to Harold Cottham

7.8 miles, a little over 4 hours, and no mud! Our reward - a cold drink in the pub and the knowledge of having experienced the, 'English countryside at its best'. The Gonalston circular aka 'The nettles walk!'

This was a great walk - thank you to Dave Kay and Ian Raynor.
