NOTES FROM THE COMMITTEE MEETING

John Godber Centre 3rd August 2022

Apologies rec'd from Sue Tedstone

Minutes of previous meeting was approved with no matters arising.

We are to take part in a John Godber Centre open day, to be held on Sunday 21st August, between 11am and 2pm, Display boards and leaflets to be available. Volunteers sought.

A position of Deputy Editor to be sought to cover for Steve when he is unavailable to ensure continuity of the newsletter. We have had a volunteer to edit and issue the October issue.

'Prompt Slips' to be tried over the next few months to try and gender increased support for various issues.

Our guest speaker for our August monthly meeting is David Skillen, talking about the 'Gretton Girls and Devil's Porridge', followed by a short talk from three of our group leaders, covering six of our groups, after our coffee break.

The group leaders meeting arranged by Sue was a great success, with much import and many new suggestions, including a revamped back page for the newsletter, which was discussed and agreed.

Our webmaster as always assured us that all was up to date, we discussed the possibility of recording short videos as a means of promoting individual group activities and also our u3a as a whole on Facebook.

The treasurer's report was tabled, discussed and accepted. Thankfully Barclays have at long last finalised our bank mandate, so full steam ahead. Authorisation of payments was discussed and the need to have invoices passed prior to payment.

A letter has been sent to the Lovelace Theatre Group to see if they would be interested in procuring the collapsible stage from us, no reply yet received.

John Godber Centre is still to purchase the defibrillator, so until bought we cannot run a course on how to use it, we are to chase them to query when this is expected to be obtained.

1st Aid Course has been investigated, however, is very expensive, project put on hold, pending further enquiries.

U3a Notts Network 40th Anniversary Flash Mob to be held on Saturday Sept 24th has had to be relocated to The Highfields Park on University Boulevard, setup starting at 12 noon, a Steel Band at 13.00, Beacons and banners arriving at 13.30, short speeches. Flash Mob at 14.00, Steel Band at 14.30, 15.30 finish. A video of the Line Dance is expected shortly and will be sent to all participants. At present we only have six participants, more to be sought at next meeting. All current participants to be notified of new location.

Members update shows a total of 485 members, being 442 full, 21 associated & 22 affiliated. A future meeting for recent new members to be arranged and possibly (re)introducing a temporary 'buddy' system, also contacting new members after a few months to enquire how they were getting on.

THIS MONTHS SCAMS UPDATE

The never-ending battle against fraudsters continues, we are still plagued with swindlers, fraudsters and scammers who are only too keen to relieve us of our well-earned cash. They also have absolutely no conscience and are more than happy to target the elderly.

Energy Crisis Scam

Due to the extreme increase in energy costs, scammers are exploiting the situation and our desire to cut costs by pretending to offer energy bill refunds to get your bank details and providing access to government grants to help with cost - BEWARE

Fake Energy Bill Rebate Scheme

It's not taken long for scammers to jump on the back of soaring energy bills. Emails using the logo of the energy regulator Ofgem claim to offer an 'energy bill rebate scheme' worth up to £450 per household. The email gives a link to click on which directs you to a fake online portal where victims are urged to share personal and payment details in order to claim their refund. As always do not open the link and give no details

Fake BP Fuel Credit Cards

A scam offering petrol and diesel at reduced cost, all you have to do is purchase a prepaid card to get your discount, just sign up and pay, – too good to be true? Always a scam.

Car Insurance

Getting a quote or quotes online for your car insurance, then just after receiving you quote receiving an email offering to undercut all previous quotes, again just supply your bank details and sign up. This is called Ghost Broking.

Never give your bank details to anyone you don't know or do not trust and never give your bank card PIN number to anyone you don't trust implicitly. Likewise, your PIN number should never be written down.

When drawing cash out of an ATM then always cover your hand as you enter your PIN number.

On the day that the two day heatwave ended the National Trust group set off for Waddesdon Manor, in Buckinghamshire. The venue owned by the Rothschild Family is certainly one of the jewels in the National Trust portfolio.

Despite several diversions due to road works close to the venue we arrived safely at the venue for 11.00am.

A visit to the Stables cafe was then followed by a timed tour of the Manor itself. Set over three floors the Manor had an enormous number of rooms to view. The volunteer guides and an excellent guidebook providing all the information needed.

There was a special exhibition devoted to Alice de Rothschild, a display of Gainsborough paintings and so many special rooms to explore most members were inside the Manor for over two hours. Once outside there were beautiful gardens to explore and over the day a film crew arrived to set up to begin filming a period drama during the following two days. Staff were generally tight lipped about the name of the production but a new Netflix programme or Bridgerton were mentioned. After a lovely day we set off for the return journey at 4.00 pm.

NATIONAL TRUST GROUP - OCTOBER VISIT.

Our October visit on Monday 10th will now be to Quarry Bank Hill in Cheshire.

The site reflects the thriving cotton industry which existed for over two hundred years and still hums today with the sight and sounds of the people who worked there, with the heritage machinery still operating. The mill was powered by the most powerful wheel in Europe. Although production stopped in 1959 you can still walk to the village of Styal to see where the workers lived. The mill owners house can also still be toured. There are also gardens and the other usual features of a National Trust site.

George Green was 14 years old when his father built the windmill and for much of the rest of his life George worked in the windmill. But George Green was also a brilliant mathematician and physicist who from the age of 40 spent 6 years at Caius College at Cambridge University.

We were split into 2 groups for a guided tour of the Windmill; the group not on the tour were able to spend time in the science centre and the community garden.

Our guide Sam Boote who is a member of Keyworth u3a was very knowledgeable and this is what he wrote to me a day after the visit:

"Hello David, Thanks for your comments, and it was a pleasure to meet your members and show them round the mill. Your 2 groups were the most attentive and engaged that I have yet encountered."



It was a good day out and recommended for a family visit especially if you have the pleasure of grandchildren over the school summer break.

Following the visit many of us enjoyed a prearranged meal on the way back at The Arrow in Arnold.
