The email contains a dodgy link leading to a website where you're asked to complete a survey about your shopping habits and pay a delivery fee to receive the 'free' kettle. Obviously this leads to you giving bank details to pay for the delivery charge.

Fake energy refund emails circulating again

We sent out a warning about this in May, but it's back and doing the rounds. With tomorrow's energy price cap announcement, please be cautious of any energy emails appearing in your inbox. The government help with your fuel costs will be taken off your bill by your energy supplier over six months discounts. Winter fuel allowances will be paid in the same way as always.

READING GROUP

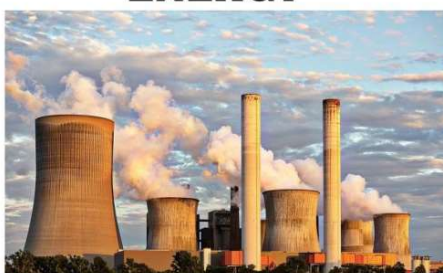

The August circular walk was kindly led by Roy Brown.

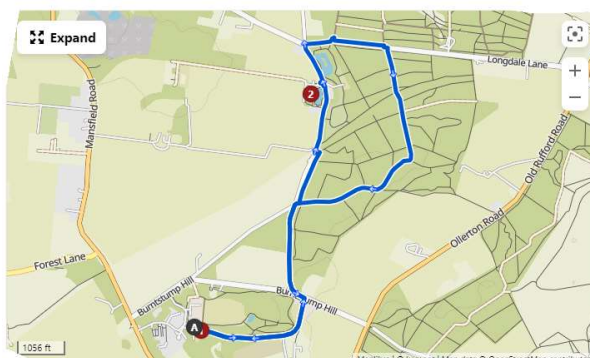
We started from Jacksdale Garden Centre and the route included The Erewash Country Park and we returned via the village of Westwood. The scones at the garden centre are highly recommended.
