# **This Months Scams Update**

#### Fake "Mum and Dad" Scam

A recent scam that has increased by 60% this year relies upon parents wanting to help their children. You receive a text message allegedly from your son or daughter, giving you a new telephone number saying that they have lost their phone and this is their new number. Shortly after comes a request for a smallish loan normally a few hundred pounds to be transferred to their bank as they are running short having bought the new phone. Their bank details are given. Not being a large amount, many are transferring money requested. It is of course a scam. Always check before acting.

## British Gas email scam offering a fake energy refund

Scammers are impersonating British Gas with fake emails tempting recipients to click a link to get a fake energy refund. Although the email looks legitimate, it addresses you by your email address and not your name. This is a potential giveaway that it's from a fraudster.

#### **Think Five**

If you get any cold calls or emails, always take five seconds, just to think, can this be true, sounds too good? Then usually is.

I'm currently rearranging our cancelled 2020 trip to Menorca but find that several of our group are unwilling to go abroad; this means I have a few spare rooms available. Rather than just release the spare rooms back to HF Holidays I thought it would be a good idea to offer them to Hucknall U3A members first.

Any U3A member joining the holiday would not be expected to act as a guide as I already have sufficient sighted guides, though volunteers are always welcome.

#### Summary details

Departure 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2023 for 7 nights half board in en-suite rooms. Hotel Seth 55 Santo Tomas: good quality hotel with pool & other facilities.

4 Days guided walking: 2 grades of walk.

1 Day sightseeing: Cuitadella (former capital) and elsewhere around the island.

1 Day free

Easier walks: 4 – 7 miles with up to 600ft ascent. Harder walks: 7 – 10 miles with up to 1000ft ascent.

Some areas have rocky paths.

Group price is £1,025.05 per person sharing (flights and transfers extra £250). Single supplement is £182 per person.

Deposit £250 by end of October 2022.


## **Science Group**

#### Our theme for the September meeting was based around energy.

The question being could we in the United Kingdom (where we are well endowed with wind, wave, and tidal resources) live on our own renewable forms of energy?

It is generally agreed that there is a need to move away from unsustainable fossil fuels by generating more power from renewable sources.

One currently untapped potential resource is harnessing the power of the tides at the Severn estuary by building the Severn Barrage.



Member John Tedstone presented the history and background of numerous proposed projects over the years, initially to provide a safe harbour and more recently to generate electricity.

The group was split into 4 teams, 2 to discuss reasons why the barrage should be built and 2 to give reasons to oppose it. This led to some lively discussion followed by feedback presented by a spokesperson from each team.

At the end a vote was taken which was unanimously in favour of building the barrage providing that the environmental impact especially on migratory and overwintering birds was addressed.
