Notes from The Committee Meeting

Committee held at the John Godber Centre on Wednesday 2 November 2022 at 10 am.

Present:

Melvyn Francis, Chair Angela Cornish, Webmaster Chris Eagle, Assistant Speaker Secretary Gary Holmes, Treasurer Tina Holmes, Vice-Chair. & Short Courses Organiser Mark Jackson, Business Secretary Lynda Smeathers, Events Organiser Sue Tedstone, Groups Organiser Greg Umney, Membership Secretary

Apologies for absence were received from Sandra Green, Minutes Secretary, Liz Attenborough, Equipment Organise and Diane Heenan, Speakers Secretary.

Minutes of Previous Committee Meeting were approved and signed. There were no matters arising from the Minutes.

Chair –

- a. Sandra Green has sent her resignation as Secretary and from the committee with immediate effect due to health issues.
- b. Terms of Office need to be considered for future to ensure that we have people in place to step into the committee roles. Currently, Mark, Diane and Angela retire in 2024, Melvyn and Greg will retire in 2026, Tina, Gary, Liz, Lynda, Chris and Sue in 2028. It was agreed that succession planning needs to go on the Agenda from January to start looking for replacements.
- c. 8 people have paid their deposit to attend the Chinese New Year Buffet at Springwater in January.
- d. The North Nott's Neighbour Group (NNNG) want to restart their North Nott's Network meetings, these ceased during Covid. The Chair, Vice Secretary and Business Manager have been informed, as they would be members of the Network. The group runs peer support groups for all committee member roles which were useful in the past. Melvyn will keep the Committee informed. Mark informed the Committee that as well as the NNNG we do accept other affiliated members. It was agreed that we would continue to accept affiliated members from all other U3a's not just NNNG, as this is seen as a positive benefit to the groups. Sue will inform group leaders that anyone can attend a free session of a group to see if they wish to join it, regardless of which other U3a they are a member of.
- e. This led to a discussion of the 3 memberships we offer, Full, Associate and Affiliated. Full member can attend any group and the monthly meetings. Associate members must be a member of another U3a and can attend any groups and the monthly meeting. Affiliated members are a member of U3a elsewhere and does not pay us any money but then cannot attend our monthly meetings. Mark informed the committee that the levy to U3a has now gone up to £4, after discussion it was agreed that this cost would be passed onto associate members. Increasing the cost for associate members.
- f. It was agreed that the front row would be designated seating for those with hearing issues.
- g. The Chair to remind the monthly meeting attendees that it good manners to be silent during any presentations.

Groups' Co-ordinator – Sue Tedstone reported as follows:

- a. New Bridge for Beginners group is now full and has had two successful meetings. 23 paying members and 4 helpers.

- c. It was agreed the room fees and tea and coffee for the meeting be paid for out of group funds.
- d. Complaint about meeting changing. Going forward Sue will ensure that once she has been informed of any changes to go on the newsletter and website
- e. A member has suggested a card making group and Sue and has been looking into this. Lynda informed Sue about a proposal for a Calligraphy group and gave Sue the details of the person willing to run the group.

- c. 100 Membership badges are in the process of being ordered.

Business Secretary – The Third Age Trust AGM resolutions and amendments meeting went ahead. No resolution was passed.

Any other business – A new minute secretary is required. A member can be co-opted for this role.

The next Committee meeting will be held at the John Godber Centre on Wednesday, 4 December 2022.

The meeting closed at 12 prompt.





This Months Scams Update - November

Watch out for phoney Amazon texts

Scammers impersonating Amazon are sending texts asking you to follow a link to secure your account following attempted logins, which is a typical tactic to incite panic. If you click the link it takes you to a convincing fake Amazon website where you're prompted to enter your login details.

The website could look genuine enough if you don't take time to assess it

Remain vigilant on energy scams

The latest energy scam capitalises on the fact that the government's £400 energy grant has started being rolled out this month. It's a text that asks you to click a link to sign up for the grant.

You should not receive a text about it as it will be applied to your energy account automatically. As we head into the colder months, please remain vigilant about energy scams.

Don't fall for the lure of high-risk investments

With inflation far outpacing savings account rates and unregulated investments claiming to offer far higher returns, there's growing temptation for the unwary to be tempted by these types of schemes. As always, if it sounds too good to be true, it will be.

Walking Group (Medium Length Walks)

October's walk was led by Chris West and Mandy James and took place in the beautiful surroundings of Hardwick Hall Estate on a perfect, bright and sunny autumnal morning.

Twenty of us met up at the Miller's Pond National Trust car park and set off around the pond followed by a steady ascent through woods and up grassland before following a flat and gravelled drive to one of England's tiniest villages, Ault Hucknall, (not a hamlet, despite its tiny size, due to its Saxon church which was the worship place of Bess of Hardwick herself!)

We then picked up a footpath crossing two fields followed by another leading to the pretty village of Rowthorne, where we stopped at the start of the Rowthorne Trail for our coffee break. After continuing along the tree lined trail for half a mile or so, we turned off to take the path through woods and fields to Norwood, on the edge of the Hardwick Estate. Re-entering the estate, we walked through Lady Spencer's Wood (where the ladies of the Hall would take their exercise) up to the Stable Yard where we stopped for lunch, making the most of the tables, benches and 'facilities', not always a feature on our walks - luxury!.

We admired the exterior of the Hall (currently undergoing repair work), the impressive home of the formidable Bess of Hardwick, the second most powerful woman in England in Tudor times, after Queen Elizabeth I, largely due to her outliving four, increasingly wealthy husbands, and hanging onto her inheritances....

The last leg of the walk involved a gradual descent across a grassy hillside down to the ponds and car park, followed by a well-earned drink, for some, at the Hardwick Inn.

Walking Group (Long Length Walks)
