
The event's organiser is currently liaising with JGC for suitable events for us to partake in, she will maintain contact with the centre manager.

#### NatWest phishing scam:

Look out for a scam email that claims the phone number on your ac-count has been changed.

Scammers are impersonating NatWest in phishing emails designed to scare recipients into handing over their bank details.

These emails involve fraudsters attempting to deceive NatWest customers into entering their online banking login information on a dodgy website.

Amazon issues warning to customers amid growing threat of impersonation scams

Amazon says it has taken down thousands of phishing websites and dodgy phone numbers in an attempt to stop fraudsters in their tracks.

Scammers have repeatedly targeted Amazon, looking to deceive its customers via calls, texts and emails. We recently reported on Amazon Prime scam calls, where fraudsters persuaded victims into downloading software to give them access to their device.

#### **Lunch Group**

On 26<sup>th</sup> April 28 of us visited The Countryman in the Kirkby in Ashfield area which was much enjoyed. On the 24<sup>th</sup> May we are booked into The Corinthian, Goldsmith Street, Nottingham and a £5 deposit is required. #### **National Trust Group**

On Tuesday 25th of April sixty eight members of the group were booked in to visit Upton House in Warwickshire. So in addition to the usual coach we also had the use of a minibus.

The house and grounds were originally owned by Lord and Lady Bearsted. The family gained enormous wealth through ownership of the Shell oil company which allowed them to build the house and spend large sums on the furnishings. The house being used for the family's weekend retreats from London.

There is a fabulous display of paintings and porcelain with paintings by Stubbs, Hogarth, Bosch and El Greco amongst many others.

Outside the layered gardens contain a mirror pool, a sunken garden an orchard along with the main lawn.

The grounds also included a woodland walk, restaurant, gift shop and plant area. The journey home up the motorways saw only relatively quiet traffic flows so we were back in Hucknall for six o'clock.

The weather was again kind to us and made for a lovely and relaxed day out.

#### Not So Grumpy Old Men Group

16 NSGOM met with our guide, Shaun, for the start of a Southwell Minster' tour that would collapse nearly 1000 years of history into 75 minutes. While seated in the Norman Nave what comes to mind is, how did they bring sandstone from quarries in Mansfield and then construct a three-story building featuring columns 30ft in circumference? It took 50 years (more than an average lifespan at the time) The Minster revolved around the needs of the people, stained glass windows were used to tell stories. The finest examples, made in 1528, displays four biblical events, the colours are clear and vibrant and the scenes have perspective. Much within the Minster displays the skill of medieval craftsmanship; in the Chapter House there are countless examples of naturalistic carvings. One of our group had to find the hidden pig! The craftsmen carved what they saw around them; they saw the mythical Green Man and the 'leaves of Sherwood'.

Next came coffee and cake, in The Refectory.

The Minster is near to the road that linked London to York, had extensive forest, deer, the Trent and 4 natural springs; an ideal stopping off point for, 'progresses' going to York; consequently, The Archbishop's Palace was built.

In the afternoon our guides Christine and Patricia took us into the State Chamber. We were given a short history of the lives of Cardinal Wolsey and James I. In the Bishop's Garden, we were able to visualise how the Palace might have looked, built around a central courtyard.

The volunteer guides, who appreciated the interaction and banter with our group, displayed passion for, and dedication to, their work; intertwining history with anecdotes and concluded with a poem; making the day a memorable experience.

PS. The guides intermated that NSGOM was an erroneous description of those present.
