July Scams

Beware of doorstep scams

It can be challenging to distinguish between a genuine doorstep seller and a scammer.

Doorstep scammers are people who show up at your front door out of the blue with the intention of either tricking you out of money or gaining access to your home.

It's important to be cautious when dealing with strangers who appear unannounced at your doorstep, good advice it to always say NO.

Cyber-romance scammers

Romance scammers are targeting vulnerable individuals on charity Facebook pages that focus on sensitive topics such as mental health, bereavement and ageing. We've seen scammers lurking on pages belonging to Age UK, The Good Grief Trust and Mind.

Romance scammers often use grooming techniques, where they connect with their victims before exploiting them financially.

Remember, it's crucial to stay vigilant and cautious when interacting with strangers online, especially on platforms where vulnerability is prevalent.

Beware of fake Microsoft fraud protection emails

If you have a Hotmail or Microsoft Outlook email account, watch out for fake 'fraud protection' emails that prompt you to log into your account.

These emails claim to be from the Outlook Support Team, are flagged as 'high priority', and state that they come from a 'trusted sender'. The messages inform you that there's been suspicious activity on your account and say you'll need to click a link to log in. If you do so and enter your details, you could end up giving personal information to scammers, potentially compromising your other accounts.

Microsoft will never ask you to provide personal information or login credentials via email.



National Trust Group

National Trust visit to The Wimpole Estate, Cambridge. Our longest journey of the year saw the group make an earlier than usual start to the day by leaving Hucknall at 8.30 am.

After a journey of just over two hours we arrived to fine weather at the beautiful and very large Wimpole Estate.

The Estate is one of the jewels in the National Trust collection.

There has been a dwelling on the site for over two thousand years and the site has evidence of Roman occupation. Many families have occupied the house over the years before the last owner Mrs Bambridge, the daughter of Rudyard Kipling, bequeathed the property to the National Trust upon her death in 1976.

Unlike most National Trust properties the many rooms reflect different periods from history. A Roman bath contrasted, for example, with a 1770's dining room.

Elsewhere in the grounds are a large walled garden, a working rare breeds farm including shire horses, pigs and sheep.

The grounds which are set in beautiful countryside also had a range of well signed walks. A courtyard with a large gift shop, cafe, an area selling plants and a nearby church all form part of a wonderful estate.



Everyone agreed that it was a lovely site and well worth the early start!! Leaving Wimpole promptly at 4.00 pm we were back in Hucknall for 6.20 pm.

Our next visit on July 31st takes us through the Peak District to Quarry Bank Mill in Cheshire which still has a working mill and other buildings connected to the once thriving cotton trade.

Not So Grumpy Old Men Group

On a sun kissed day towards the end of June, a group of Not so grumpy old men took a trip to one of Nottinghamshire landmarks.

We are referring to Clipstone Headstocks, which we learnt that they were once were the tallest Headstocks in Europe, but now are the tallest in the World.

Stuart Cutts who purchased the Headstocks from the Coal Authority a few years ago, gave us a guided tour of what is now, a Listed Building.

We were shown various artifacts used during the production of coal including the man riding cage which held up to 70 miners over 2 levels which was used to transport the men to the pit bottom. Various other items are displayed including underground loco's, detonators, Coal cutting machinery, and numerous former items used by NCB/British Coal/RJB Mining and UK Coal whilst the Mine which in its heyday produces over 1 Million tonnes of coal per year, right up till it's closure in 2003.

An interesting comment made by Stuart that when he takes some school trips round he shows them a lump of coal, many don't know what it is!!!.....doesn't that make you feel old!!!

A trip I would recommend to various groups within u3a, especially the science groups as the engineering in the production of coal we found very interesting.



Afterwards as is customary with the NSGOM, and I am sure many miners did after a shift at the Pit, we called into the Larch Farm at Ravenshead for a most enjoyable drink...and meal.
