Discovering Britain Group

Discussion Group

Discussion subjects for this month included:

What are your opinions about Andrew and the future of the monarchy – revisited from last month - Following last month's topical discussion we reflected on what we now know about the outcome. Although we are envied for our monarchy from across the world, calls for deporting and punishing were not supported, points were made about whether he had actually committed crimes and that the charges media fuelled by homing in on him, when other high profile people were almost certainly involved, they have not been investigated.

Grooming and sex workers - Exploitation and grooming is a serious problem with people drawn into situations which they cannot escape from, especially youngsters under the age of consent. Sex workers have always been around. Laws around how they can be kept safe were discussed.

Is there still a class war in this country - Overall the answer was 'yes'. Qualification and background can still be taken into account in many professions and careers of their children. Comments included, 'jobs for the boys'. There are still barriers caused where people are educated and contacts within professions. Historically, some jobs needed contacts/relatives already doing the job.

Should wealthy pensioners give up pension - A lively discussion about how pensions work. One point was that if you have saved for retirement it seems unfair that you should be unable to have the same rights to people who have not saved. There seems to be a lack of information to guide people through their rights.

Christmas presentation - A light-hearted last item where everyone agreed that many of the gifts given are not really needed and ended up as charity gifts raising money for worthy causes.

Not So Grumpy Old Men Group

In early October seventeen Not So Grumpy Old Men visited the Newark Air Museum, probably the most impressive private aviation museum in the UK. The static display outside includes the iconic Vulcan bomber, the Hastings transport aircraft, crucial to the Berlin airlift & the maritime reconnaissance giant, the Shackleton – shown in the picture.

There are two indoor exhibition halls, containing a variety of jet & piston engined airframes, with a special emphasis on RAF training types over the years, used to train fast jet & multi engined pilots, navigators, bomb aimers et al. In addition there are numerous airframes from the US, French, Polish & Swedish air forces.

By special dispensation Grumpies had the opportunity to get in the cockpits of numerous aircraft types, both large & small (I'm talking airframes not Grumpies!).



The museum is open all year & has a plethora of aviation related material, both historical & contemporary. If you haven't visited it's well worth considering making the effort. I'm sure you will not be disappointed.

Science Group

In part one we shared a presentation about medical advances during the 1950s.

It is a time when many of us were growing up, and the decade marked major progress in individual medical interventions and in public health.

To summarise some key advances.

Jonas Salk's injectable polio vaccine and Albert Sabin's oral version dramatically reduced the disease. Advances in heart surgery introduced artificial valves, pacemakers, and routine open-heart procedures. Dialysis programs began, while vaccines curbed the Asian flu. New antibiotics and tranquilizers emerged, alongside recognition of the cancer risks linked to smoking.

We also shared a celebration of two significant birthdays of David Wormall and Lynda Jackson 1955 and 1935 babies. But which was which?





After the break using small cardboard and bigger plastic 'jet propelled 'model planes group members carried out a practical investigation into how aeroplane wings and angle of launch affect flight path and distance.
